

DR. DANIELA KATO

Japan, Folklore and Nature Creatively Connecting to Place

How do you become of a place, get to know and tell its tales with respect and reverence when you are not from that place? How do you creatively gather and bring alive the remains of local folklore in the face of sweeping social and environmental change?

For nearly two decades now, Japan has been one such place for me. I first caught a whiff of the unruly, mischievous world of its folklore when, as a child, I watched a series of animated cartoon folktales broadcast on Portuguese television in the early 1980s. This was a world inhabited by goblins, ogres, mountain witches and all manner of shape-shifting animals, where human existence was precarious and yet also lived in intimate connection to wild places and the natural cycles of life and death, growth and decay. After I moved to Japan in 2007, I still caught a scent of such wilderness here and there, but its vital signs kept weakening as I settled in the genteel world of academia and began relating to folklore mainly through the lens of literary scholarship. Things took a wild turn when, with the onset of the pandemic, I moved to a small village in northern Yamanashi and retrained as an ecotherapist and shinrin-yoku guide. Ever since, I have been reconnecting to Japan's countryside and its folktales through a series of creative practices of storytelling and community building.

In this talk, by interweaving storytelling, scholarship and personal reflection, we will explore ways of reconnecting to nature and place in an age of increasing uncertainty when much we used to hold true is falling away. While the focus is on Japanese folktales, you will be encouraged to reflect on and connect to your own locality – and thereby to confront these challenges with a renewed sense of purpose and creativity.

Dr. Daniela Kato is an independent scholar, writer and ecotherapist based in Yamanashi, Japan. She has published widely on the ecology of folk and fairy tales, and is keen to tell old and new stories that inspire audiences to reconnect with the magic of nature in the places where they live.

C. MANGALAM SENTHIL & MR.MUTHU CHANDRAN Lights and Shadows Traditional Indian Leather puppetry storytelling

Shadow puppetry is a beautiful folk art, widespread in South India, allegedly the motherland of this art; this genre is known by different names and forms in different parts of India like – *Ravanachhaya*, *Tholu bommalatta*, *Togalu gombe atta*, *Tholpava koothu*, *Tholpavaikoothu* and *Charma bahuli natya*. In the 45-minute programme, you will glimpse this age-old tradition with a performance by award-winning shadow puppeteer Mr Muthu Chandran from Tamil Nadu, India. He will also be sharing his in-depth knowledge of the art with the participants. Alongside him is FEAST member C.Mangalam Senthil who will share her journey and experiences of doing shadow puppetry.

ABOUT Mr.Muthu Chandran

Award-winning Shadow Puppeteer Mr Muthu Chandran grew up learning the art from gurus, his father, Mr S.Balakrishnan and his grandfather, Mr G.Subbiah Rao. He has staged more than 3000 shows and has an experience of over 31 years to date in the field. He has performed in various art, culture, heritage centres, schools, colleges and festivals. He is gifted with the extraordinary talent of being able to talk in 31 different voices and 2 languages (Marathi & Tamil). His awards include "Kalai Valarmani", "Kalai Mamani", "Veedhi Virindhu", "Pondicherry Art & Culture award", and the "Gold Medal", in addition to being featured in the ACME Book of World Records. He has been featured in all the Tamil newspapers and magazines and "The Hindu". He has performed extensively across TN and many parts of India. His leather puppets dance in the light to the rhythm of his hands, toes, and words. A delight to watch and hear, his performance leaves one mesmerised, asking for more.

ABOUT Dr. Murti Bunanta

Murti Bunanta is the first person to receive a Doctorate from the University of Indonesia, Jakarta, using research in children's literature as the topic for her dissertation in 1997. She is the founder and president of *The Society for The Advancement of Children's Literature* or *Kelompok Pencinta Bacaan Anak* (established in 1986), a non-profit organization that pioneers various activities to develop children's reading in Indonesia. Murti has written approx 250 essays and given numerous lectures on children's literature, nationally and internationally;

Her Collections of Indonesian Folktales have been published in the USA by Libraries Unlimited entitled *Indonesian Folktales* (2003) and by Groundwood in Canada entitled, *The Tiny Boy and Other Tales from Indonesia* (2013). She has visited schools and libraries, telling stories in India, South Africa, Iran, Laos, Thailand, Malaysia and Sweden.

She is a certified facilitator of **Timeslips**, an evidence-based approach to guide persons with dementia to creative story-making and is trained in the person-centred approach to arts facilitation. She has been planning storytelling programmes for older persons to engage with artefacts from museums and to tell stories with confidence. DAVID NOVAK Massaging the Story

This workshop presents David Novak's approach to process and performance for storytellers.

In 'Massaging the Story,' David presents games and exercises designed to challenge thinking and interpretive skills when composing stories for performance. What can we discover in our stories that we have never seen before? What might our stories mean, and what is our reason for telling them? In 'Exercising the Listener', we consider the listener's experience. What catches their attention? What refreshes their interest? Throughout this master class, participants will be given storytelling 'etudes' and opportunities for 'spot coaching' on varying elements of their stories and performance techniques.

Highly prized for his ability to bring ancient tales, classic myths, and original stories to life and enthrall audiences of all ages, American storyteller David Novak, is in demand for his school presentations, stage plays, keynotes, and workshops.
